



#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

#### **Overview**

The ARISE Plus seventh six monthly progress report covers the period 8<sup>th</sup> November 2020 to 7<sup>th</sup> May 2021. The activities carried out support the ASEAN economic integration effort and are guided by the ASEAN Economic Community Blueprint 2025. ARISE Plus supports 12 Elements and 14 Strategic Measures of the ASEAN Economic Blueprint (AECB) ARISE PLUS also supports 7 priority areas of the ASEAN-EU Plan of Action.

Despite the COVID-19 restrictions, 41 major activities were implemented together with 11 regional workshops. Building on the experience from the previous six months with adapting to COVID-19, ARISE Plus has sustained regular and rich consultations with the ASEAN Secretariat, relevant sectoral working groups, committees and the EUD Jakarta. These have served to enrich EU-ASEAN collaboration in supporting AEC integration efforts and have led to deeper and more strategic cooperation efforts as manifested through several major results delivered by ASEAN and ARISE Plus.

Several tangible and significant results have been delivered by ARISE Plus to-date and a summary of the major results is provided below.


### Major results during the reporting period

The major results during the reporting period are summarised below. For additional details please refer to Section 1 of the report under the respective activities.

# Supporting ASEAN to review progress from 2016 to 2020 and to enhance strategic decision making for the AEC Blueprint 2025, from 2021 to 2025

Through the support provided for the mid-term review of the AEC Blueprint 2025, ARISE Plus has improved the ability of ASEAN to monitor AEC progress through high quality data collection, analysis and triangulation. Through this evidence-based exercise the strategic direction of ASEAN economic integration and broader Community-building efforts for the second phase of the AEC Blueprint from 2021 to 2025 has been enhanced. ARISE Plus supported this through major contributions to the AEC Blueprint 2025 mid-term Review (MTR) including private sector engagement, focus group discussions with business councils, review of external studies, support for compliance monitoring, review of sectoral progress, detailed analysis, synthesis and write-up.

The MTR of the AEC Blueprint 2025 was virtually launched on 28<sup>th</sup> April 2021 under the patronage of the ASEAN Secretary -General, EU Ambassador, Deputy Secretary-General, members of the High-Level Task Force on Economic Integration (HLTF-EI), ASEAN-Business Advisory Council (ASEAN-BAC) Chair and over 350 other participants. These senior officials emphasised the importance of five key messages resulting from the MTR of the AEC Blueprint 2025 to adapt, improve and intensify efforts towards the AEC integration process. These include the importance of results-based management such as results-oriented planning, monitoring, reporting and implementation, focussing on quality and impact instead of quantity and outputs, keeping up with mega trends such as digitalisation, and improved communication and coordination to enable better cross-sectoral efforts and integration.







The MTR also contributed 12 tangible recommendations to enhance AEC integration efforts from 2021 to 2025.

# Making seamless movement of goods in ASEAN a reality through the operationalisation the ASEAN Customs Transit system (ACTS)

ASEAN achieved a major breakthrough in the "free movement of goods", with the technical assistance and facilitation of ARISE Plus. Following three phases of piloting, the first two live runs of the movement of goods under the ACTS were successfully completed and now is being implemented on a live operational basis. Several ACTS training sessions for the public and private sector stakeholders have been carried out. These sessions are on-going and available on demand basis. In November 2020 the VIP launch of the ACTS took place involving senior officials from DG DEVCO, DG TAXUD, the Ambassador of the EU to ASEAN, Secretary General of the ASEAN Secretariat, senior officials from the AMS and senior executives from the Freight Forwarders Association including DHL. Live operations involving Cambodia, Lao PDR, Malaysia, Singapore, Thailand and Vietnam, along the north-south and east-west transit transport corridors have commenced with the support of ARISE Plus. An ACTS Central Management Team (CMT) has been capacitated to operate the ACTS. Additional ACTS upgrades have been made. ARISE Plus continues to provide further support through bi-lateral mechanisms to resolve queries related to ACTS Customs guarantees with strong buy-in of the participating ASEAN Member States. An example of this was the signing of an MoU between the Lao Customs Department and Lao Development Bank to provide guarantees for private sector taking part in ACTS. To encourage buy in and to create further awareness ARISE Plus has produced publicity material in the form of promotional leaflets, banners and videos and these materials are available on the ACTS Information Portal. ARISE Plus also supported publicity campaigns through national and regional media channels to create awareness amongst potential ACTS traders including importers, exporters, transporters, freight forwarders and customs agents.

#### Expanding seamless movement of goods through improved multimodal transport

ARISE Plus has been supporting the ASEAN Framework Agreement on the Facilitation of Multimodal Transport (AFAMT). The first multi-modal transaction from Thailand to Vietnam was successfully carried out between 30<sup>th</sup> October to 2<sup>nd</sup> November 2020 through a combination of road and sea. Based on analysis of the pilot execution a report on the current status has been produced.

To further develop multimodal transport operations and to connect the dots to advance implementation, ARISE Plus has prepared a strategy proposing how transit in general and ACTS in particular can be enhanced to handle multimodal transport operations. A draft initial survey on the expansion of ACTS to handle multimodal transport among Multimodal Transport Operators (MTOs) has been prepared. This data will further facilitate ongoing efforts to operationalisation of AFAMT in ASEAN.

#### Enhancing ASEAN regulatory environment for trade in goods through legal review of ATIGA

Based on a demand driven request, ARISE Plus undertook a legal review of the ASEAN Trade in Goods Agreement (ATIGA) which included a legal analysis and comparative benchmarking and produced a 424-page draft Final Report. The report took into account the existing ASEAN obligations and also the commitments under the most recent RCEP Agreement. In addition ARISE Plus also prepared two summarised and reader friendly matrixes on the full report and the ATIGA-RCEP Comparative Analysis. Additional support was provided through bilateral discussions and consultations with seven ASEAN Member States, namely Brunei, Cambodia, Indonesia, Lao, Malaysia, Philippines and






Singapore. Regional level and national level engagements demonstrate strong buy in and commitment from the various stakeholders and enhance the quality of support provided by ARISE Plus.

# Improving regulatory transparency for business through identification of NTMs and update of the ASEAN Trade Repository (ATR)


The work to increase ASEAN trade-related regulatory transparency is making good progress through the ASEAN Trade Repository (ATR). The ATR provides the private sector with the latest NTM information which in turn supports decision making to facilitate trade within the ASEAN Region. The work on identifying NTMs Involve several important stages such as identification, classification, verification within ARISE Plus and validation by AMS authorities before being uploaded to the ATR. To enable this detailed process, ARISE Plus has deployed experts to engage with authorities in charge of the respective NTRs and web-linkages to the ATR. Efforts to gather and classify the relevant NTMs in sub categories before being uploaded into the ATR are ongoing. The Identified and classified NTMs will then be verified within the ARISE Plus team before being submitted for validation by respective AMS authorities. Cambodia, Indonesia, Lao PDR, Malaysia, Myanmar, Philippines, Thailand and Viet Nam have actively participated in the ongoing efforts showing significant progress and heightened ownership.

Continuous support to relevant ATR/NTR Focal Points and competent authorities at AMS have been provided by ARISE Plus through webinars. The overall number of validated NTMs uploaded to the ATR by AMSs has significantly increased from 1936 in May 2020 to 3782 validated NTMs uploaded by April 2021.



# Strengthening food safety and quality through harmonised regulatory regime and traceability systems

ARISE Plus has supported the strengthening of harmonised regulatory regime for food safety and quality in ASEAN, through the development of the ASEAN Food Safety Regulatory Framework Agreement (AFSRFA). The work has involved facilitation of cross-sectoral integration efforts involving the Prepared Food Product Working Group (PFPWG), Health Cluster 4 and the ASEAN Sectoral Working Group on crops, fisheries and livestock ensuring the principle that food safety has to be assured across the entire food chain which led to the final draft of the AFSRFA. This is currently awaiting signing by the member states.







ARISE Plus has contributed to additional supporting instruments such as the Mutual Recognition Agreement (MRA) of Food Hygiene for Prepared Foodstuffs. It is currently supporting the Joint Sector Committee to implement the MRA through a training course of several modules that will increase capacity in implementing the operating procedures. We have continued to support the full operationalisation of the ASEAN Risk Assessment Centre (ARAC) for Food Safety through capacity building in risk assessments. ARISE Plus has supported the development of the ASEAN Guidelines on Traceability for Food and Feed and facilitated several consultations to resolve differences of opinion and establish an ASEAN consensus on the key principles and elements for traceability and a endorsed version of the guidelines. We have also supported the delivery of training *on* Rapid Response in Food Safety Issues and Crisis phase II and on food borne disease outbreaks.

In organic agriculture, ARISE Plus has supported the development of an advanced draft version of the Organic Agriculture MRA, the ASEAN Organic Agriculture Certification Scheme and a proposed ASEAN Organic Mark with high level of consensus amongst member states.

# Strengthening transparency, quality and safety in pharmaceuticals in ASEAN through a harmonised regulatory regime

ARISE Plus has supported efforts of ASEAN to strengthen transparency, quality and safety in pharmaceuticals. During the reporting period a roadmap for the development of the ASEAN Pharmaceutical Regulatory Framework Agreement was developed and adopted by the member states. ARISE Plus supported the development of first Drafts of the ASEAN Pharmaceutical Regulatory Policy (APRP) and the ASEAN Pharmaceutical Regulatory Framework (APRF) with deliberations facilitated through video conferencing. Capacity building has been provided to ASEAN officials through training in the first of 3 modules of the programme of training of evaluators for the Bio-equivalence MRA.

#### Monitoring ASEAN progress in the SDG 2030 agenda through statistical support

ARISE Plus has continued to support the ASEAN Statistical Community in the monitoring of SDG progress. This includes strengthening of ASEANStats capacity in conducting a review and preliminary data analysis of the SDG indicators. ARISE Plus has provided a number of capacity building programmes to the ASEAN Statistical Community. This included regional training on seasonal adjustments, statistics in international trade in services (SITS), foreign direct investment statistics (FDIS) and international merchandise trade statistics (IMTS). These have improved the capacity of ASEAN staff to undertake more accurate analysis and development high quality statistical reports. ARISE Plus has also supported the Member States and ASEANStats in raising the visibility of statistics, high -quality video-graphics, and the availability of clear guidance and strategies for improved communication in statistics.

#### SECTION 1 PROGRESS ON PROGRAMME ACTIVITIES



### **Component 0: Management and Outreach**

#### **Sub Component 0.1 Programme Management and Coordination**

Following a successful Mid-Term review of the programme in January 2020 an extension was signed in August 2020 extending the programme until November 7<sup>th</sup> 2022, with an additional €7.4 million of funding taking the project to 5 years and €22.5 million. The focus of the activities during the extension period will be on ensuring key outputs delivered to-date contribute to major results, and on ensuring sustainability of the results. The resources made available during the extension will provide support to ASEAN Economic integration efforts during a critical period that includes ASEAN's recovery from the impact of COVID-19.


The project has refined its remote management working practices with weekly project meetings involving all key experts and long-term non-key experts, with additional meetings amongst groups of experts working on specific activities. The project has continued strong engagement with the relevant counter parts in the ASEC and Sectoral Bodies using teleconferencing tools such a Skype, Zoom and Blue Jeans to ensure continuation of activities.

Despite the substantial impact of COVID-19 on travel and physical meetings, a total of 41 major activities were implemented during AWP3. To gain a visual picture, the key project management indicators are shown below.

The number of activities supported by the project was reduced during AWP3 due to a combination of a reduction in demand from beneficiaries and a shift to remote based support in many cases. Which took some adjustment.







While 52 NKE experts were contracted for TA during the period, the travel constraints spread out the inputs that were able to be provided as ASEAN and the EU adjusted to the new working practices.







Despite the challenges faced the long-term experts, supported by short term experts and the ACTS software team were able to deliver a total of 3598 expert days of TA support to the ASEAN Integration process, including 1835 expert days during the reporting period.







The negative impact of the pandemic was most acutely realized in the reduction of events organised and hosted by the project. This certainly impacted the delivery of training while outreach events and webinars were less effected. Out of the 21 workshops and events implemented during AWP3, 11 were implemented during the reporting period.

### **卓 Number of Workshops**









A key objective of this reporting period was the coordination between the ARISE+ regional and national projects. Project teams from 2 ARISE Plus regional projects and 8 ARISE Plus national projects (Cambodia, Indonesia Lao PDR, Malaysia Myanmar, Philippines Thailand and Vietnam) have coordinated/shared project objectives expected results and activities. In addition, regular meetings have been held with ITC who are running 5 out of the ARISE+ 8 projects.

In addition the Team leader has engaged in:

- Regular consultation all relevant stakeholders, including high level officials in ASEAN and EU Delegations;
- Provided strategic inputs to the AEC pillar of the ASEAN Secretariat;
- Managed the team of Key and non-Key Experts, including the reviewing of ToRs for NKE's,
- Monitoring of performance and outputs using internal monitoring tools;
- Reported regularly to the EU Delegation on progress achieved in implementing the programme;
- Participated actively in M&E activities, including corrective action and integration of best practices learnt from the previous 3 years;
- Ensured coordination across all ARISE Plus components, including those to be implemented at the national level in the future.

#### **Sub Component 0.2 Demand Driven Contingency**


No additional or new requests for support were put forward during the reporting period, which is most likely to be reflection of the impact of COVID-19.

### **Component 1.0: Trade Facilitation and Transparency**

Component 1 on Trade Facilitation and Transparency is organized on the basis of three Sub-Components of activities in order to: 1) logically reflect the areas of ARISE Plus intervention mandated under the ToRs; 2) better organize the provision of support in light of the results to be achieved and the needs expressed by ASEAN during the coordination meetings and consultations held within the relevant ASEAN Sectoral Bodies in AWP1 and AWP2 (i.e., SEOM, ATF-JCC, CCA, CCS, CCI, the respective AMSs' ASEAN Chairs, ASEC, ABAC, etc.); and 3) leverage on the combined resources of each cluster of activities for purposes of achieving the overall trade facilitation results mandated under ARISE Plus.

Despite the impact of the *Covid-19* pandemic, all activities are largely on course vis-à-vis the Work-Plan objectives and/or the 'on-demand' nature of the support to be provided. Particularly noteworthy is the further progress that has been achieved, during the last 6 months of project implementation, both in quantitative and qualitative terms, with respect to the progressive operationalization of the *ASEAN Trade Repository* under Sub-component 1.1. In fact, the number of validated non-tariff measures (NTMs) uploaded on the ATR has grown from 3,244 to 3,782, equivalent to a 17% increase. During this semester, two new cases were filed under the system of *ASEAN Solutions for Investment, Services and Trade* (ASSIST), one lodged by a business council and the other filed for the first time ever by an ASEAN law firm on behalf of a client, and the legal assessment and comparative benchmarking for the *General Review of the ATIGA* has been finalized and submitted to the *Coordinating Committee for the Implementation of the ATIGA* (CCA), together with a dedicated comparison between the ATIGA and the recently-concluded RCEP Agreement.

Going forward, Component 1 shall continue to follow the planned support and focus will be placed on the progressive implementation of the ATR (completion foreseen for end of 2021, as per the AMSs' determinations within CCA and SEOM), continuing support of private sector engagement (outreach and awareness creation on ASSIST, as well as re-launch of Roundtable Discussions on Trade Facilitation through dedicated webinars), and high-level legal support to AMSs and the ASEAN Secretariat vis-à-vis the crucial process of General Review of the ATIGA. On demand activities shall remain available to ASEAN with respect to ASSIST (primarily outreach activities and IT and operational support of the ASEAN Secretariat), strengthening the NTM notifications to comply with Article 11 of the ATIGA, and the appropriate tools to address outstanding NTMs cases under the Matrix of Actual Cases (MAC), as well as for purposes of streamlining NTMs in light of the post-*Covid19* Recovery Framework.

It does not appear that *the Covid-19* pandemic will significantly slow down or prevent the implementation of any activity under Component 1 and the expectation is that considerable progress can be achieved during the next six months, especially vis-à-vis the progressive operationalization of the ATR, given the good degree of ownership currently displayed by most AMSs (to be recalled that BD and SG are no longer supported by ARISE Plus).



#### **Sub-Component 4.2 ASEAN Statistics Capacity Building**

This section focuses on the activities implemented under the Work Plan 3 (WP 3) for the period of 1 November 2020 - 7 May 2021 under the component 4.2 - ASEAN Statistics Capacity Building. Irrespective of the travel restrictions due to the Covid-19 pandemic, out of the eight Terms of





References (ToRs) approved during the first half of WP3 (Q2-Q3/2020), five ToRs are ongoing, implemented through distant support; two had been postponed and only restarted in late April 2021; and one is postponed until late 2021.

During the second half of WP3 (Q4/2020-Q1/2021) four new ToRs were developed and received the EUD approval in the middle of February; and one developed later, received approval in late April 2021.

Since October 2020, with international experts providing distant support can now be permitted, 13 ToRs could be implemented, involving 7 international experts (7 ToRs) and 7 regional experts (7 ToRs).

Over all, Two ToRs have been completed; 11 ToRs are ongoing, with 5 ToRs having experienced some delays. Detailed information about the ToR approval and implementation status, is presented in Annex 2 and Annex 5 of the report of the S-NKE on Coordination of Statistics Capacity Building Activities.

#### SECTION 2 INTERNAL MONITORING ASESSMENT

This section provides an internal monitoring assessment of the ARISE Plus programme since the commencement of the programme. The internal assessment focusses on core assessment criteria of relevance, partnerships, efficiency and effectiveness in line with the Monitoring Strategy of the programme. The analysis covers the programme for a period of 3.5 years, from its inception on 8<sup>th</sup> November 2017 until 30 April 2021. The monitoring analysis provides aggregate data and in selected areas it provides a breakdown by reporting period.

#### Relevance




Figure 1: relevance of ARISE PLUS

ARISE PLUS has had a strong level of relevance to the needs and priorities of its stakeholders, namely the ASEAN Secretariat, the ASEAN Member States (AMS) and the European Union (EU). The relevance of ARISE Plus has manifested itself through the strategic support it provides to 12 Elements and 14 Strategic Measures of the ASEAN Economic Blueprint (AECB) and 38 Key Action Lines of the ASEAN Consolidated Strategic Action Plan (CSAP). ARISE PLUS also supports 7 priority areas of the ASEAN-EU Plan of Action and 5 Sustainable Development Goals. These can be visualised from figure 1.

ARISE Plus workshops were also highly rated in terms of relevance with an average score of 83.16% across 3 questions covering relevance in the feedback questionnaires across 90 workshops implemented from commencement until March 2020<sup>1</sup> involving 3,180 workshop participants.

This provides very limited scope and practical avenues for gathering feedback data from workshop participants as many of the events were coordinated by ASEAN. During the next reporting period, feedback mechanisms will be strengthened for online events and will enable the availability of data.



#### **Partnerships**




Figure 2: overview of ARISE PLUS partnerships

The ARISE PLUS programme has engaged with 13 ASEC Divisions, 38 ASEAN Sectoral Bodies, working groups and ASEAN entities and 85 AMS entities as illustrated in figure 2.




Figure 3: ASEC Divisions engaged<sup>2</sup>




Figure 4: overview of types of AMS Ministries and agencies engaged

### **Efficiency**

#### Availability and utilisation of resources




Figure 5: expert days used (by reporting period)




Figure 6: incidentals used (by reporting period)

A total of 2,855<sup>3</sup> key expert (KE) days, 8196 senior non-key expert (SNKE) days and 204 junior non-key expert (JNKE) days have been used since programme commencement until end of April 2021. Over 177 non-key expert (NKE) assignments have been contracted and 2,085,255 Euros of incidentals utilised. The utilisation of resources can be visualised from figures 5 and 6.




Figure 7: activities implemented by reporting period

Resources used have resulted in the implementation of a total of 41 major activities during the reporting period. The number of activities implemented during each successive reporting period can be visualised in figure 7.




Figure 8: number of regional and national workshops by reporting period




Figure 9: workshop participants by reporting period

A total of 5,408 participants have attended workshops since commencement of ARISE Plus including 1,410 workshop participants during reporting period 7 as visualised in figure 9.




Figure 10: number of ARISE PLUS workshops hosted by AMS (from inception)

As illustrated in figure 10, ARISE PLUS workshops were hosted by all AMS demonstrating the strong ownership of the programme amongst AMS.




Figure 11: breakdown of workshop participants by nationality

ARISE PLUS workshops have been characterised by an effective inclusive approach. All 10 ASEAN Member states are well represented across the participants. A total of 1,794 participants from the CLMV countries have attended the workshops. See figure 11 below for a breakdown of workshop participants by nationality.




Figure 12: breakdown of workshop participants by gender
